Transgression and the disjoined nature of architecture.

Abstract:

Transgression is here to change the way buildings function, but if trans-programming, cross-programming, and developer led community consultations are our new norms what are the new articulations of the relationship between concept and experience, which are brought about by the disjunction between the two? For Tschumi transgression does not mean the methodical destruction of any code or rule that concerns space or architecture but it means overcoming unacceptable prevalence.¹

This paper will examine three separate market regeneration projects for towns in the UK recently designed or realised by Group Ginger Architects, to question if the disjoined nature of architecture is its revolutionary potential and if uncertainty and the pleasure or violence of disjunction can be used to develop an Architecture that '[...] transcends its paradoxical nature by negating the form that society expects of it. In other words, it is not a matter of destruction or avant-garde subversion but of transgression.' The three case studies are Scarborough Market Hall and Vaults refurbishment and ongoing associated events, such as the immersive film/music event 'Shifting Sands'; Chesterfield outdoor market reconfigured for seasonally diverse uses and Doncaster Market, one of the largest markets in the UK, which includes 'performative' production.

Challenging the normative modes of architectural practice engenders collaboration and questions existing policies, guidelines, buildings and the current purpose of place. How can local events call the status of architecture into question, to change it and its role in society, and ultimately the society itself?

Sarah studied architecture at the Architectural Association, London (AA Dipl), completed the Professional Practice in Architecture at The Bartlett, UCL and has taught architectural design in Architecture schools in London, Sheffield and Leeds. She is currently External Examiner for the Master of Architecture course at Huddersfield University (2019-2023), and Professional Examiner for the Professional Practice, RIBA Part 3 exams at The Bartlett (2019-20). She is a Senior Fellow of the Higher Education Academy and a member of SCHOSA. Sarah was previously Postgraduate Course Director in Architecture and has co-led the MArch design research unit 'Cinematic Commons' since 2013, engaging in international collaborations, exhibitions and research workshops (Mumbai, Mexico City, Tokyo, Marseille, London), which are now being documented in the forthcoming website and book. She has worked at several architecture practices on projects in the UK, Germany and Qatar and collaborates with Group Ginger. Sarah's research reconsiders future models of interdisciplinary practice and the relationship between architecture and film in challenging urban conditions. She has published and curated exhibitions nationally and internationally.

Simon Baker AA Dipl, RIBA, ARB

Simon Baker is an architect, educator and researcher; he currently teaches on the Master of Architecture Course at Sheffield University. He studied architecture at the Architectural Association, London (AA Dipl – Narrative Architecture Dipl 10), and completed the Professional Practice in Architecture at The Bartlett, UCL. Simon founded Group Ginger Architects in 2014 to offer an accessible design studio focused on place, identity and distinction; followed in 2018 by Ginger Works, a Leeds City Free Room including open meeting space for exhibitions and community events along with a small-scale fabrication open workshop. Simon has previously worked at director and board level positions at Terry Farrell and Partners and CZWG Architects. He was Design Council CABE, Building Environment Expert 2010 – 2020; Concourse, Architecture Centre for Leeds City Region; Chair and trustee 2009 – 2019 and RIBA Yorkshire Regional Chair 2013 – 2016. Simon's practice - based research re-appropriates underutilized spaces to challenge urban conditions and reactivate spaces via community engagement and recent projects have included the design for established annual light-based festival in York, a single night pop up cinema and an art installation sited on a disused viaduct, in Leeds.
